HENDERSON

What we say goes no further than this room. Okay? So let's get down to the in-fighting. You have been a thorn in my side for years, Straker. Persistent excessive demands for diversion of resources to your organisation. Now you're saying a total clearance programme.

STRAKER

Right.

HENDERSON

And I'm saying while I'm running this commission I'll fight you on this every inch of the way.

"CONFLICT"

FREEMAN

....Oh, you've been practising ...

MADDOX

What are you working on anyway, Alec?

FREEMAN

One of Straker's projects. It's a beautification campaign.

MADDOX

Well I won't deny you could use it ...

FREEMAN

Space junk. Straker wants it all cleared.

MADDOX

Well the Astrophysical Commission takes care of any space junk. Anything with hazard

potential.

RREEMAN

Straker has an idea it could be used by the Aliens to crack our defence system. I'm beginning to think he may be on to something.

MADDOX

Well your report shows it's a possibility, the junk gets cleared. So what's the problem.

FREEMAN

James L. Renderson is the problem.

HENDERSON

Cost...Time...Personnel...Resources... You want reasons ... why not? I can give you a hundred.

STRAKER

Listen, Henderson. Every item of space junk could be cleared in a matter of weeks ... if the Commission gave its full support. As to the cost, I admit it would be high but safety factors alone would justify it.

HENDERSON

Safety factors?

STRAKER

Yes. My organisation uses space more than any other. My pilots take more risk with that junk in one month than ...

HENDERSON

...my men do in a year? No, we need facst, Straker. Details, statistics. You just don't have them.

STRAKER

Don't I?

HENDERSON

Of course you don't.

STRAKER

I have my report.

HENDERSON

Your report!

STRAKER

You promised that the commission would not take a final decision on the clearance programme until my report had been fully considered.

HENDERSON

And so it won't. However, I must confess I don't think it will have that much influence.

STRAKER

Well if that's so, Henderson, it must be because you've already swung the commission against it.

HENDERSON

We've just completed the annual clearance of all items of space junk we consider a menace to navigation. v/o The cost was more that n double that of last year's operation.

STRAKER

And worth every penny.

HENDERSON

Do you realise what a full clearance programme would cost?

STRAKER

Look, I'm not gonna swap dollar signs with you, Menderson. Mens lives are at stake. Now I want that junk eleared: Every last piece:

STRAKER

Well where is he?

FOSTER

On his way, sir. Commander Straker.

FREEMAN

Freeman.

STRAKER

Alec, I want that space clearance report.

FREEMAN

I only just got here and there's data still

-missing.

STRAKER

I don't care what's missing. It looks like Henderson's dommission have already decided against a major space clearance project. We have to convince them otherwise.

FREEMAN

Will you give me twenty four hours?
It can't make any difference to you.
But it could make a heck of a difference to the report.

STRAKER

I want that report, Alec. I don't care what shape it's in. Just get it back here.;

JOAN

Shado lunar module 32 cleared for take-off at 14.1. 34. Stand by.

MADDOX

Roger, Moonbase. Confirm T.E.T.

JOAN

Affirmative. Trans-Earth trajectory green. Lift off, 32.

MADDOX

Check Delta co-ordinates.

STEVENS

Co-ordinates correct, sir. Earth orbit insertion, two hours thirteen minutes, eight seconds, sir.

MADDOX

Contact Shado H.Q. and Moonbase. Tell them we're going for EOI in 43 minutes, 29 seconds.,

STEVENS

Right, sir.

JOAN

32 reports Earth Orbit Insertion at thirteen zero eight - 21, sir.

FOSTER

Contact SID. Tracking procedure green. Has Sheda H.Q. been alorted?

JOAN

Yes, sir.

FREEMAN So everything's fine?

FOSTER Straker's not gonna think so. He's

expecting you.

MADDOX Re-entry angle 6 decimal 58 degrees.

EOI ... 4 minutes, 12 seconds.

STEVENS A sighting, sir. At 7 zero three five.

= That's in behind us. Confirm sighting. MADDOX

Affirmative, sir...and it's closing fast. STEVENS

Contact Moonbase. MADDOX

Thirty two reports unidentified sighting, sir. JOAN

FOSTER Signal red alert:

V/O What's happening? Angle increasing. MADDOX

His angle of re-entry is too steep. Tell FOSTER

him to correct angle of re-entry.

JOAN Loss of signal, sir.

V/O Still increasing...Something's pulling MADDOX

us off course. We've got to correct. Pitch actuator, one decimal three burn.

Earth Orbital Insertion now. JOAN

STEVENS No response. We're in trouble.

Look, Henderson. All I need is another 48 STRAKER

hours.

V/O Another 48 hours? HENDERSON

Yes. I can have a summary o f the completed STRAKER

report in your desk by then.

You know I can't hold up the commission any HENDERSON

longer. Why don't you let me tell them you've decided to withdraw your proposals?

I'd get you off the hook.

I intend to hold you to your word to consider STRAKER

my report before making a decision on the

clearance programme.

All right, Straker. I think I'm reading HENDERSON

you. You want an alibi for that pilot of yours who killed himself and his crewman.

You want to blame it on the presence of uncleared

junk.

I want your word, Henderson. STRAKER

HENDERSON On one condition.

You consider your space craft was in a finish

re-entry collision with an item of space junk?

STRAKER It's a possibility.

HENDERSON It's a possibility..yes.

So you suspend all lunar flights until we've fully investigated the er...incident.

STRAKER Do you realise what you're doing?

HENDERSON Yes, Commander, I do. I'm proving to the Commission that your organisation in it's present form is an expensive and

unworkable luxury.

STRAKER Ah, Miss Ealand. Hard at it?

MISS EALAND I'm always hard at it. Sometimes you notice.

How did it go, sir?

STRAKER Go? D'you know the code word "Washington

Square", miss Ealand?

NORMA Not without looking it up. It's not one

we use regularly.

STRAKER It's one I thought we'd never use...

MISS EALAND What does it mean, sir?

STRAKER It means shut down. Cancel lunar flights.

The virtual isolation of Moonbase.

V/O Shado Control to all unit commanders.

Washington Square. I say again...

Washington Square.

Immediate compliance Washington Square.

JOAN Colonel Foster? Sorry to disturb you,

sir. Code message from Shado. Washington

Square. I'll check it right away.

FOSTER There's no need. It means shutdown.

FREEMAN What?

FOSTER More specifically it involves

complete ban on all orbital flights.

NORMA v/o Colonel Freeman for you.

STRAKER Put him on.

FREMMAN Why the ban on moon flight?

STRAKER Henderson.

FREEMAN But why? What about the report?

STRAKER Forget it. The Commission are gonna believe

that it's aan attempt to blame space junk

for the Maddox crash.

FREEMAN When in fact you think it was....

STRAKER Maddox. Pilot error. Take a rest,

enjoy the scenery, Alec.

FOSTER What's Straker going to do?

FREEMAN I don't know.

FOSTER He doesn't usually take a thing like this

lying down.

FREEMAN You couldn't call it typical.

FOSTER And then there's Maddox. What do we do about him?

Forget all about it?

FREEMAN Well what else can we do? Any pilot can

make a mistake and you're only allowed one!

FOSTER Not Steve Maddox.

FREEMAN Anyone can make a mistake.

FOSTER Not Steve Maddox! He's too experienced.

FREEMAN What caused the re-entry error?

FOSTER He reported an unidentified sighting just

before loss of signal.

FREEMAN But the Trackers couldn't pick up anything.

FOSTER Well there must have been something.

Space debris ...

FREEMAN Maybe.

FOSTER Maybe... And we just sit back and do nothing

about it?

FREEMAN No. We make sure it doesn't happen again.

FOSTER Get me 32's electronic log.

JOAN Captain Maddox's flight?

FOSTER Yes.

FREEMAN What's going on here? What the devil's going on?

V/O Who's in that module?

JOAN V/O Colonel Foster.

FREEMAN Why didn't you tell me?

Any of you?

JOAN Colonel Foster's orders. On no account

were we to tell you until take-off was

imminent.

FREEMAN And irreversibly.

Paul, cut your motors. I said cut your

motors! v/o Paul, this won't help.

FOSTER What won't?

FREEMAN Taking out a module...If you're doing

it for the reasons I think you are.

FOSTER I'm gonna fly the same course Maddox flew.

FREEMAN Under precisely the same condition.

FOSTER

V/O Yes.

FREEMAN

You're crazy! What will it prove?

FOSTER

For one thing, that Maddox wasn't responsible

for the loss of his ship.

FREEMAN

V/O What if you do make it? It won't

mean much.

FOSTER

It depends on how I get through.

FREEMAN

And if you don't?

FOSTER

Then I don't ....

OPERATOR

Roger. Three... Roger.

JOAN

What is it?

FOSTER

Two nine calling Moon base.

FREEMAN

V/O Everything under control?

FOSTER

So far ... EOI in two hours ...

thirty eight minutes, twenty two seconds.

FREEMAN

Roger. Have you contacted Straker yet?

FOSTER

No. But I've a feeling he'll be contacting

me soon...

OPERATOR

Sighting at Galactic latitude 43 decimal one Altitude 14 decimal five three.

2ND OPERATOR But that's Moonbase operations area.

OPERATOR

Right. Call Commander Straker.

STRAKER

V/O You'll turn back right now:

FOSTER

EOI in one hour precisely. I've gone too

far for that.

STRAKER

You're right, Foster. Much too far!

FOSTER

Module two nine to moonbase.

JOAN

Go ahead two nine.

FOSTER

Re-entry in 6 minutes, 9 seconds.

JOAN

Roger.

FOSTER

Moonbase ...

FREEMAN

V/O Receiving two-nine.

FOSTER

EOI in 4 minutes. 3 seconds.

FREEMAN

Re-entry angle, 5 decimal seven three degrees. Confirm. v/o 2-9 confirm re-entry angle.

Stay on 2-9:

OPERATOR

2-9's re-entry angle, sir. It's...

FREEMAN

Paul, adjust re-entry angle. Cut back to five. v/o Cut back to five, Paul. You're far too

shallow.

If he doesn't adjust, he'll bounce off FREEMAN

the Earth's atmosphere out into space.

STRAKER Colonel Foster?

Foster here, I'm happy to say. FOSTER

v/o Congratulations. STRAKER

But don't let my delight at your survival blind you to the fact that we have a few matters to discuss.

Oh, you've gone too far this time, Straker. HENDERSON

STRAKER I don't see it that way.

You authorised a lunar flight: HENDERSON

I authorised nothing. STRAKER

Look, Straker, I don't want to argue with you. HENDERSON You are responsible, whatever the circumstances.

I agree. But Colonel Foster has proved that STRAKER there is interference with out inter-orbital flights.

HENDERSON Has he?

Yes. And I almost got killed doing it. FOSTER

HENDERSON So you say ...

Yes, I say!! FOSTER

My apologies. STRAKER

Thank you. HENDERSON

I think it's time we laid our cards on the STRAKER

table, Hend erson.

All right. I'll tell you what I think of HENDERSON

Colonel Foster's so-called proof.

You knew the Commission was going to turn down your space junk clearance programme so you

instructed Foster to make that flight.

Now why would I do that? STRAKER

Because you were desperate for evidence. HENDERSON

STRAKER Go on ...

You authorised the flight to rig this HENDERSON information. But you won't get away with

it. The Commission convenes the day after tomorrow. By the time I get through, you'll

be out of a job.

Is that all? I'll see you at the Commission STRAKER

meeting.

Indeed you will, Commander. HENDERSON

Can he really do it? FOSTER

Do what? STRAKER

FOSTER Ease you out.

STRAKER He can try.

What about our evidence? They've got to FOSTER

take notice of that.

STRAKER Evidence! What's it gonna lock like when

Henderson claims that we manufactured it just to get a space clearance programme.

FOSTER But we're right!

Scmetimes, Colonel, that's not quite enough. STRAKER

The tracking data's been processed, sir. JOAN

FREEMAN Anything?

Not that we can see. JOAN

We should have been able to pick up something. FREEMAN

There's nothing on Colonel Foster's log except JOAN

a record of manouvres.

Send it down to Shado Headquarters. FREEMAN All right.

So what do we do now? FOSTER

STRAKER Any suggestions?

No, but we can't just sit around. FOSTER

I've solved quite a few problems by "just sitting STRAKER

around" as you call it, Colonel. I suggest

you try it yourself sometime.

Commander, the tracking report on Colonel OPERATOR

Foster's flight has just come in from Moonbase.

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STRAKER And  $\dots$ ?

Nothigg unusual, sir. OPERATOR

All right. STRAKER

FOSTER Well that leaves the MV3 detector.

They're processing the data now. STRAKER

we haven't had much luck so far. Maybe we're

due for a break.

The MV3 data, sir. OPERATOR

Ah, thank you. Looks like an SPS rocket STRAKER

of some sort.

Like the limpet rockets used in debris FOSTER

destruction.

Yeah, But it doesn't make sense. STRAKER

why would the Aliens put a device like this

into earth orbit.

It could be programmed to attack moonship flights. FOSTER

A blockade on Moonbase? Maybe ... STRAKER

Why hasn't our radar picked it up?

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FOSTER Space debris! It's based in one of those

burnt-out rockets over there.

STRAKER Well assuming your right...which one could

it be?

FOSTER Well considering Maddox and I flew practically

identical flight paths, it would have to be... one of these two here...or Apollo eight here...

or B47...

STRAKER Four possibilities.... I think we're on to something.

FREEMAN That should be okay ...

Freeman...

STRAKER Alec, I have an assignment for you.

I want you to launch the interceptors. The MOssion... to destroy four pieces of space junk. I'll have control relay the co-ordinates direct to the astronauts.

FREEMAN You mean space junk in Earth orbit?

STRAKER Right. And I mean use all three interceptors.

FREEMAN All three?

STRAKER V/O Yes, I know.

It'll leave Moonbase undefended. Nevertheless,

do it, Alec. v/o At once.

FOSTER Now wait a minute! D'you know what's gonna

happen when Henderson finds out about this?

STRAKER Ah yes... Henderson. Why don't you go over

and tell him, Colonel?

FOSTER What? He'll go beserk!

STRAKER Yes... Take a nice slow drive. Give me about

half an hour.

FOSTER I hope you know what you're doing.

FREEMAN Control to interceptor leader. Steer programmed

course to earth orbit. You will receive destruct details direct from earth.control.

...out.

STRAKER Miss Ealand, when James Henderson calls tell

him I'm unavailable.

MISS EALAND And when he arrives, sir?

STRAKER Show him right in. The red carpet treatment,

he's a very important man. You can expect him

at three o'clock.

HENDERSON I want to see Straker immediately. And before

you try to fob me off with some damn fool excuse, I'm talling you I won't take no for

an answer.

MISS EALAND But of course you may see him, Mr. Henderson.

He's expecting you ... Go straight in.

HENDERSON Oh. Thank you.

HENDERSON Straker!

Ah, Henderson. You're late. Won't keep STRAKER

Studio business. you a moment.

Well I think it's a great script, Mr. Steiner.

There we are. Cleared for shooting.

STEINER Thanks. You know, I like the way you operate.

STRAKER Thank you.

Your policy of non-interference... STEINER Some executives crawl all over you.

STRAKER Well I can assure you, Mr. Steiner, you'll

see very little of me.

And I'll give you a film the studio will STEINER

be proud of. Thanks again. Nice guy. Goodbye ...

STRAKER Goodbye.

HENDERSON All right, Straker.... You know I never touch them

Woice identification. STRAKER

HENDERSON James Henderson.

V/O Identification positive. Henderson James 1.

STRAKER Thank you.

1 tried to call you, Commander. I was told HENDERSON

you were not available. Were those your ins-

tructions?

STRAKER Yes.

HENDERSON I see ... a very high-handed atitude.

However, one more question. Is it true you ordered all three interceptors to destroy

certain items of space junk?

STRAKER Correct.

HENDERSON Do you realise what you've done?

STRAKER You tell me.

HENDERSON

You've blatently and openly defied the Commission. And left Moonbase and the

Earth defenceless.

SERAKER It was my decision. I realise the implications.

You had better start packing, Straker. When HENDERSON

the Commission hears about this you are through.

Aren't you interested in hearing my reasons? STRAKER

No. Let's be kind. Let's put it down to HENDERSON

a mental abboration. The strain of command ...

Get those interceptors back on Mconbase, Commander,

while you can still give orders.

SERAKER Sorry, Henderson.

Don't push your luck, Straker. If Moonbase HENDERSON

reports ....

STRAKER ... a UFO sighting? Stick around. I'm

expecting it.

JOAN Possible contact 2 4 8. Zero 1-6 red. Contact confirmed. UFO 2 4 8. 136 red.

FREEMAN Red alert. Get me Shado Headquarters.

JOAN V/O UFO maintaining course 248. 204 Green.

STRAKER Get the termination.

OPERATOR Request Trajectory Termination.

JOAN V/O Predicted termination One F. 026

Southern England.

Close enough. It's target is this studio! STRAKER

Maintain visual contact on countdown.

OPERATOR Yes, sir.

STRAKER Then order a complete shut-down.

OPERATOR Shut-down?

STRAKER Everything! V.H.F...Radar...the computers...

Complete radio silence.

HENDERSON Straker!

STRAKER As you said, Henderson, I can still give

orders. Complete shut-down. Do it!

OPERATOR Termination eight minutes, four seconds.

Commander Straker, I'd like to talk to you HENDERSON

in your office. You, too, Colonel.

Straker, I'm relieving you of your command. Colonel Foster will take over as of now.

STRAKER You can't do it, Henderson. You require

the unanimous backing of the commission.

HENDERSON You think I won't get it?

STRAKER Yes, I think you could get it, but it'll

take time.

HENDERSON And this base is due to be attacked in

a few minutes!

Colonel Foster, assume command.

Colonel:

I take my orders from Commander Straker. FOSTER

STRAKER

Now for the first time in your life, you're going to listen. The Aliens put a satellite into earth orbit, using a

piece of space junk to cover it. Why? A blockade on Moonbase? A logical reason, but obvious. Too obvious. In time we would

have located and destroyed it. So the satellite was a decoy, a red herring for something bigger. An attack on this headquarters. They hoped

the satellite would draw the interceptors from

monnbase.

And you fell right into the trap. HENDERSON

STRAKER I acted as if the plan had worked, yes. It would take a Ufo of great destructive power to destroy this underground base.

didn't want that hanging over our heads.

HENDERSON All this guesswork does not explain the shut

down.

STRAKER Why make it easy for them? The Ufo is

probaly programmed onto our radio signals.

I don't buy it, Straker. I just hope HENDERSON

you've guessed wrong. Because if you're

right, we're about to be killed.

STRAKER There's still time for you to leave.

All right. We all just sit here and wait.

HENDERSON For what?

STRAKER A voice

JOAN Moonbase to Shado control. Come in control.

It's no use, sir. It's a complete radio

shutdown.

FREEMAN What the hell is Straker playing at?

OPERATOR Four minutes to termination.

HENDERSON Straker, if we contact the interceptors there

may still be time.

STRAKER It's no good. They can't operate in the Earth's

atmosphere... And the Ufo's already in the

stratosphere.

OPERATOR Termination one minute, twenty seconds.

HENDERSON We're sitting ducks.

STRAKER Maybe. Yes?

MISS EALAND Sky One has just overflown the studio

at zero feet.

STRAKER Thank you, Miss Ealand. Switch everything on.

OPERATOR Yes, sir.

STRAKER And get me Captain Karlin.

OPERATOR Sir.

STRAKER Nice timing, Captain. Go get it.

KARLIN Roger, control.

Sky One for Moonbase. v/o Request U.F.O.

fix and attack co-ordinates.

JOAN Will relay direct to outward computer.

FREEMAN Why, Straker...The sly old ....

JOAN Fox...?
